## BROWNIE GIRL SCOUT PATCH

### Complete four of the following requirements:

- 1) Discuss with your troop each of the "Crime Prevention Is Kid Stuff" rules. With another Brownie Girl Scout, act out a skit about one of the rules.
- 2) Solve the "Find the Crimes Puzzle". Discuss it with your troop. Additional copies are available at the council service center closest to you.
- 3) Discuss with your troop what you should do if a stranger approaches you or if someone touches you in a way that makes you feel uncomfortable.
- 4) Discuss with your family and two of your friends what you have learned about crime prevention. Solve the Home Security Puzzle.
- 5) Memorize your local police emergency telephone number and post it in your home.

## JUNIOR GIRL SCOUT BADGE

### Complete eight of the following requirements:

- 1) Discuss with your troop each of the "Crime Prevention Is Kid Stuff" rules. With another Junior Girl Scout, act out a skit about one of the rules.
- 2) Solve the "Find the Crimes Puzzle". Discuss it with your troop. Additional copies are available at the council service center.
- 3) Discuss with your troop what you should do if a stranger approaches you or if someone touches you in a way that makes you feel uncomfortable.
- 4) Discuss with your troop why home security is important. Learn how to make your home secure. Conduct a home security inspection of your home. Discuss the results with your family. Learn about operation identification. If possible, engrave your valuables with your parents' Florida driver's license number. Solve the Home Security Puzzle. Additional copies are available at the council service center.
- 5) Invite a representative of your local police department to come and discuss home security and personal safety with your troop, or attend a crime prevention seminar.
- 6) Memorize your local police emergency telephone number. Make a poster with the number on it and post it in a local store.
- 7) Study the ill effects of drugs, including alcohol and tobacco on your body. What are the short and long-term effects of drug abuse, such as securing a job, police record, childbearing, etc.? Pretend that a friend offers you drugs or alcohol. Practice saying "No" in a firm and convincing manner.
- 8) Talk to at least one person who has been the victim of a crime. What precautions if any, could the person have taken to prevent the crime from happening? What effect did the crime have on the person's life?
- 9) Discuss shoplifting with a representative of a local store. How does shoplifting affect you as a consumer?
- 10) Ask your school principal how much money is spent each year on repairing or repainting damage committed by vandals. Make a list of other things that your school could do with the money.

# BE ALERT - PLAY A PART IN CRIME PREVENTION

## INTEREST PROJECT FOR CADETTE AND SENIOR GIRL SCOUTS

### Complete eight of the following requirements:

- 1) Discuss with your troop or group personal crime prevention precautions while in your home and outside of your home. Discuss what you should do if you are ever in a situation where you may be victimized.
- 2) Discuss with your troop why home security is important. Learn how to make your home secure. Conduct a home security inspection of your home. Discuss the results with your family. Learn about operation identification if possible. Engrave your valuables with your parents' Florida driver's license number.
- 3) Invite a representative of your local police department to come and discuss home security and personal safety with your troop, or attend a crime prevention seminar.
- 4) Find out if there is a Neighborhood Watch Program in your community. If there is, find out if there is an active Neighborhood Watch Program in your neighborhood.
- 5) Attend a court hearing in your community. Contact the Court Administrator's Office in your community at least three weeks before you want to visit.
- 6) Discuss shoplifting with a representative of a local store. How does shoplifting affect you as a consumer?
- 7) Learn vacation crime prevention techniques. Pretend you and your family are going on a week long vacation. What steps should you take to give your home a lived-in look?
- 8) Interview a lawyer, police officer, or judge about their careers, education, job description or how they feel about their job. Prepare your questions in advance and report your findings to your troop.
- 9) Talk to at least two people who have been victims of a crime. What precautions, if any, could the person have taken to prevent the crime from happening? Make a report and include what effect the crime had on the person's life.
- 10) Study the ill effects of drugs, including alcohol and tobacco on your body. What are the short and long-term effects of drug abuse, such as securing a job, police record, childbearing, etc.? Pretend that a friend offers you drugs or alcohol. Practice saying "No" in a firm and convincing manner.

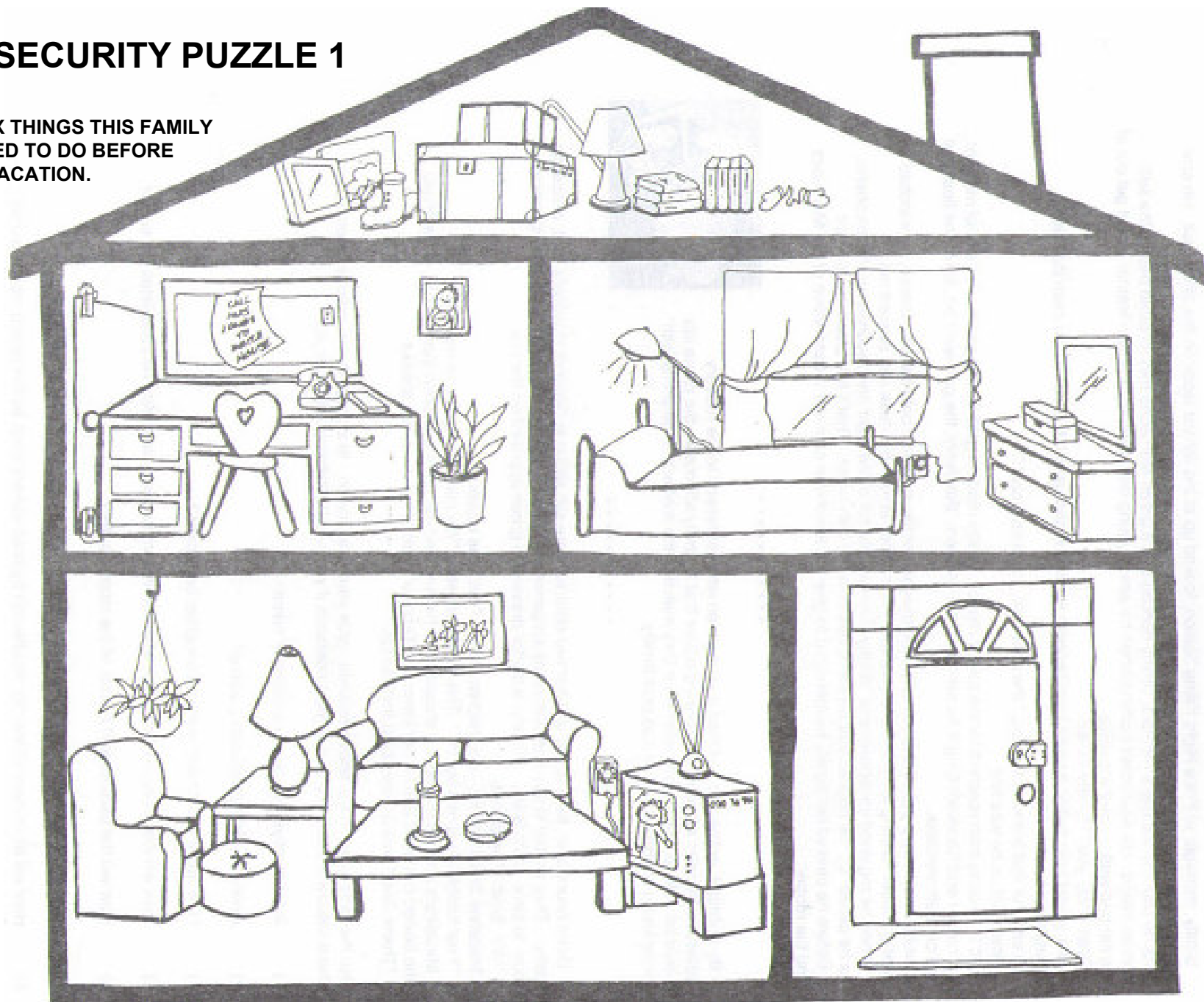
"Thank God," was all she could think to say.

## CRIME PREVENTION IS KIDS STUFF

**YES IT IS! NOTHING IS MORE VALUABLE TO US THAN OUR CHILDREN. SO WHY NOT INSULATE THEM FROM BECOMING THE CRIMINAL'S VICTIM AS MUCH AS POSSIBLE BY APPLYING SOME BASIC - YET VERY PRACTICAL - CRIME PREVENTION RULES WHERE THE YOUNGSTERS ARE CONCERNED.**

- I The old rule about never taking candy from a stranger - is still a good rule - tell them not to take candy, a ride, or even walk with a stranger - tell them why!
- I Tell them not to tell anyone they are home alone - on the telephone or at the door. Teach children never to admit anyone into your home without your permission.
- I Give your child's school instructions only to release your children to people you have designated in writing - in case of emergency.
- I Locate and point out the "Safe House" on your block and along the route to school to your children and explain the meaning of such refuges. Encourage your children to use the same route every day.
- I - Select one or two neighbors who will provide sanctuary for children should any threat or emergency arise while you are away from them. Provide that neighbor with phone numbers where you can usually be reached. Offer to do the same for those neighbors.
- I Instruct children to look out for each other and to tell you when something unusual or suspicious occurs.
- I Report to police any suspicious individuals or vehicles lurking in areas where children play. Obtain license numbers and descriptions whenever possible. Make a game of remembering license numbers - good practice for times when it is really needed.
- I Be prepared to assist a child who appears lost or in trouble. Do not hesitate to notify the police if you think a child needs assistance.
- I Teach your children to come directly home to "check in" before going out to play or to a friend's house, unless other arrangements have been made ahead of time.
- I If your child rides her/his bicycle to school, make certain she/he knows and uses the proper rules. Engrave your driver's license number on the bicycle frame and teach her/him to use a lock and chain to secure the bicycle when he/she is not riding it.
- I Crossing guards and school safety patrols are there to protect children - make sure your child knows to obey them.
- I Make a practice of keeping your home and car doors locked - your children will enjoy helping you!
